the day of April in the year of our Lord  
one thousand eight hundred and eighteen,  
Edward Harmon, a soldier of the revolution,  
aged about sixty, personally appear-  
ed before me the subscriber one of the asso-  
ciate judges of the Supreme Court of the  
State of Delaware, and being duly sworn  
on the holy evangelists of Almighty God did  
depose and say that in the year seventeen  
hundred and seventy seven he enlisted  
under Captain Pickwood of the first Com-  
pany of the Delaware Regiment, and  
continued in the service from that  
time as a common soldier until the  
conclusion of the war, when he was  
discharged by general proclamation,  
and that from the time of his enlistment  
to his discharge he served in the service  
of the State in the Army under the  
Command of General <sup>Gates</sup> Sullivan. And  
the said Edward Harmon did further  
depose and say that from his reduced cir-  
cumstances in life he needs the assistance  
of his country - Edward <sup>his</sup> Harmon  
Sworn and subscribed the day and year

Be it remembered that on this twentieth day of April in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighteen Mitchell Kershaw Lieut. Colonel of the ninth Regiment of Delaware Militia, aged about sixty years, personally appeared before me James Paynter one of the Associate Judges of the Supreme Court of the State of Delaware, and affirmed being conscientiously scrupulous of taking an oath ~~by~~ ~~swearing on the holy scriptures of~~ ~~an oath~~ ~~that~~ ~~he~~ ~~knows~~ ~~Edward~~ ~~Harmors~~, in the foregoing deposition named, an inhabitant of Superior County, and has known him from the year nineteen hundred and seventy eight or nine, and that he was at that time a soldier in the Delaware Regiment and continued in the said Regiment to the knowledge of this deponent until the sixteenth of August nineteen hundred and eighty when this deponent who he belonged to the said Regiment was taken prisoner at Gates depot, when this deponent was taken on board the prison ship at Charleston.

Be it remembered that on this seven-  
teenth day of July in the year of our Lord one thou-  
sand eight hundred and eighteen, Henekeah Lacey a  
native born citizen aged fifty four years, personally  
appeared before me the subscriber one of the associate  
Judges of the Supreme Court of the State of Delaware,  
and being duly sworn on the holy evangelists of Almighty  
God did depose and say that Edward Harmon was  
a boy in the neighbourhood where he lived, that he  
worked much of his time before he enlisted with this  
Deponents Father, that about the year seventeen hun-  
dred and seventy seven he the said Harmon enlisted  
under Captain Kikwood, and marched off with the  
Delaware Regiment, that this Deponent never see  
said Harmon from the time he marched off aforesaid  
untill the year seventeen hundred and eighty three,  
when he see him with others of the Delaware Regi-  
ment, with uniforms and equipments just as they  
returned from the Army - at the same time he  
heard People say to Harmon he was a fool to spend  
so much time in the Army without pay - that Har-  
mon replied he was willing to go again and ~~that~~  
he hoped he should get pay at some time.

On this sixteenth day of November one thousand eight hundred and twenty, personally appeared in Open Court in the Court of Common Pleas of the State of Delaware in and for Sussex County (it being a Court of Record, proceeding according to the Course of the Common Law, with a jurisdiction unlimited in point of amount and keeping a record of its proceedings, Edward Harmon, aged about seventy years, resident in Lewis and Rehoboth Hundred in the said County, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his Oath declare, that he served in the Revolutionary War as follows, in the Delaware Regiments in the Company of Captain Timberwood. The first declaration made by this deponent was on the twentieth day of April eighteen hundred and eighteen and the pension he has received has been on the ~~sub~~ pension certificate N<sup>o</sup> 1790. And I do solemnly swear that I was a resident citizen of the United States on the eighteenth of March eighteen hundred and eighteen that I have not since that time by gift, sale or in any manner disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby to diminish it so as to bring myself within the provisions of an Act of Congress entitled "An Act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the Revolutionary War" passed on the eighteenth day of March eighteen hundred and eighteen; and that I have not nor has any person in trust for me any property or securities, contracts or debts due to me, nor have I any income, other than what is contained in the Schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed, to wit,
